

Much of our Instant Gallery consisted of the 200+ decorations donated for the Christmas Tree Festival.






Casa CHRISTMAS SALE

As in the past, the Guild participated in the Annual Casa Christmas Sale on November 17 & 18. Six Guild tables were set up and manned by 7 turners. It was very successful overall. The guild paid for the tables and vendors paid 15% of their sales to the guild to cover costs of tables and Square Trade credit and raise funds for the Guild. Donated tops were sold @ \$5 each for the Food Bank. A few people just donated money and left the tops for others to buy.

SAWDUST SESSION

A bout a dozen woodturners showed up for the Saturday Sawdust Session. In addition to the regulars, it was a pleasure to have on hand some of our members who live far away. Roger Wayman drove from Cut Bank, Montana and Neil Stewart from Twin Butte, south of Pincher Creek. These fellows don't find it convenient to attend the evening meetings and drive home for hours in the dark winter nights, so it's great to see them on a Saturday morning.

Sawdust Sessions are sort of unstructured get togethers with a pre-announced loose focus. This time that focus was to introduce us to carbide tipped turning tools. Carbide tips are great if you don't like sharpening traditional HSS gouges and scrapers. Remi and Steve brought selections from their own tool collections for us to try out. I tried out a few of Remi's, but I didn't get as smooth a cut as he can. I probably need more practice, but I'm old school and I like my tools and don't mind sharpening. We really needed conventional tools to compare with the carbide cut on the same piece of wood. Perhaps, it all comes down to what we are used to and how set in our ways.

Most of the session was the guys talking about woodturning, discussing the recent Christmas sale, complaining about the price of wood and generally enjoying the company of other like-minded woodturning enthusiasts.

The instant gallery had two contributions. John Vandenberg brought his latest amazing Basket Weave Illusion piece, complete with the weave pattern on the inside. John, you must have long beading tools! And patience. Dan Michener brought a 3 piece walnut bowl. Mainly to show that he was still woodturning.

After the meeting several of us adjourned to the local A&W for lunch and to continue the small talk. The morning was another perfect sawdust session.

ANDRÉ'S PREFERRED WEB SITES OF THE MONTH

he American Association of Woodturning Annual Symposium is returning to Portland, OR from May 23 to May 26, 2024 (www.aawsymposium.org). This is the closest location it will ever get to Lethbridge. I attended in 2018 the last time it was in Portland and as I was attending the AAW Symposium for the first time, I had a red sign on my badge name and many people were taking care of 1st time attendees. It was an extraordinary meeting with everything and anything about woodturning and an outstanding treat for the eyes and the mind. The demonstrators were all more exciting one from the other. There were eleven concurrent sessions and four rotations per day for four days although Sunday was finishing midafternoon. Some demonstrations were repeated to enable more people to attend them. It was a challenge to organize a schedule. After getting there, I saw a very exciting demonstration the first day and I had to change my planned schedule as I wanted to see the two other different demonstrations presented by the same turner. There were also special events at night. The days were jam-packed. I came back with a notebook full of new ideas and know-how to do things.

A very enjoyable angle of the meeting was the presence of three other friends from Lethbridge. Dan Michener, Norm Robinson and Ross Robinson. Hanging with Norm was great as Norm knows a lot of turners and suppliers and he would always introduce me to his friends. Thanks Norm. Hanging out with Dan and Ross was also very fun and relaxing.

The Instant Gallery display was humongous and you could see many items. Be warned, a lot of more fragile items could not be handled but just looking at them was quite fulfilling. The camera shutters were going all the time around us. Then there was the Special Exhibitions section of the work from a few show-cased turners. It was unreal and beautiful at the same time! You must see that once in your woodturner life. Work after work the different pieces were just stunning! Then if you wanted to change your mind, there was the Trade show area where vendors would present everything you might have dreamed about. A lot of free advice was given. Make your equipment list before you go as it is difficult to resist everything that you see. Overall, there were so many woodturners to talk to and exchange with.

Yet another angle to attend the meeting is volunteering to help with demonstrations. Dan was the only brave one from our group and he got a free T-shirt for helping. Dan was the assistant for Vancouver demonstrator Ed Pretty. Ask him about the job and he will tell you it was very enjoyable. The outcomes were many and one, not the least, was Ed coming to Lethbridge for a May demo that was extremely enjoyed by many of us.

If there are five or more participants from our Guild, I can make a special arrangement and request for a \$40 US ("\$50 CAD) discount but we must organize ourselves ahead of time. If you are interested, please contact me by January 20 and I will do the work so that we can get the discount.

I am not a travel agent but I found that Portland was a very nice city with beautiful parks including the Washington Park and a world famous Rose Garden and an impressive collection of trees from around the world, a botanical garden. Also there is in Portland, a spectacular block of Food trucks and shacks (4 sides of the block, it was hard to make a choice), the sour beer breweries and restaurants and the largest used book shop in the world. I felt very safe in the city and the public transportation was outstanding to go through town and to the Congress Centre where the Symposium was held. My only negative surprise was the number of homeless people in Portland that I was not aware of. Apparently, the problem is less visible now. On the Black Friday weekend I could find a return fare for \$255 to go to Portland. There will be other sales after the New Year. Driving is also a good option.

BEADS of COURAGE

October 31 2023 is our year end report. We have 5 new boxes for a total of 241 to date. We have a few boxes in storage so for now we ask you to donate Tops for the children. In 2023 we had 48 Tops donated to the program "Thank You" to all of you that have donated.

There seems to be an abundance of boxes for the time being so keep those tops rolling in.

Guidelines for Turned Treasure Boxes:

- 1. In order to hold the beads, turned boxes for the Beads of Courage program need to be about 6 inches in diameter (5 inches minimum) and 5 inches deep (4 inches minimum).
- 2. If possible, have "Beads of Courage" engraved or burned in the lid, or leave a place to insert a bead.
 - The round bead sizes are: 3/4 + " with a thickness of 5/16" or 1 1/4" with a 3/16" thickness. There is a rectangle bead that is $3/4" \times 15/16"$ with a thickness of 5/16".
- 3. Make sure the lids are easily removable. Any finials should be easy for a small child to grasp and not too elaborate.
- 4. Finishing:
 - Children who receive these boxes are susceptible to germs/infections/mold. Bowls that have not been properly sealed can harbor mold. Ensure you are using a safe finishing process that does not contain toxic materials. Do not use finishes like linseed or walnut oil that take a long time to outgas.
 - Do not paint Beads of Courage boxes. Instead, highlight the beauty of the wood with clear varnish, stain, and/or burning.
- 5. John (John VandenBerg fayjohn@shaw.ca, ph. 403-380-0141) has the beads to be glued on after the box is finished. He has a limited number of them so will give them out, one per box, when you have a box ready. Contact him to request a bead.
- 6. Please complete a donation form with your finished box or bowl. You can get the forms at the Beads of Courage Canada website, or John VandenBerg will have copies of them.
