
The **Chinook Woodturning Guild** was formed in September 2004. The Guild's main emphasis is skill improvement and camaraderie.






Paul McGaffey Demonstrating a Natural Edge Winged Bowl from a Birch Log. November 2025




Displayed here is the final shape of the natural edge Bowl.




Hand drills and Braces

We had a very nice presentation and display from Vern McNeally, about a set of hand drills his personal collection and hand braces. For the hand braces, Vern brought a few including a rare example of braces to drill holes in the corner of walls or on the side of wall. Vern had uncles that were electricians before electric drills were available, but I do not remember seeing that model for holes in corners. "Eggbeater" drills in different sizes were also on display. The hand drills were fascinating as units from different companies for either drilling holes and or driving screws were presented. In many cases, Vern did extensive work to restore them into a functional state. I was also impressed by the fact that some were in their original boxes. In addition, Vern had also brought different bits that fitted the braces and hand drills. It was a very informative presentation, Vern! Many thanks.

I purchased a ONEWAY bowl saver that works on my 16-inch Capacity lathe. I only purchased a 9-inch easy core set as well as the blade sharpening jig and a carbide blade.

My first experience: I watched a video and followed instructions, I think. First cut went great. Second try not so well. I found that as I advanced the knife into the bowl it stopped cutting. I blamed the knife and decided to sharpen it only to ruin the knife. I replaced the knife and realized that to function properly the support cutter had to be advanced into the cut at regular intervals. If not, the knife starts to chatter and stops cutting.

The 9-inch knife will cut a bowl anywhere from 5 inches to 9 inches in diameter. My thinking in buying only the 9-inch diameter cutter was that if 10% of the bowl diameter is required as a rim when it dries, then there was not much room left to cut a bigger than 9-inch bowl. Of course, there is always the opportunity to buy a bigger one if needed. These are all cut on a green birch log.

The carbide blade I think was worth the money as I cut 8 cores without sharpening.

Of NOTE: ONEWAY has changed the way they sharpen the knife. So, if you have an older knife and are having to sharpen often you might consider sharpening the method or buying a knew carbide knife.

Stephen Hatcher (www.stephenhatcher.com) is a wonderful turner heading the Fine Art Woodturning and Sculpture studio in Seattle area. Starting with the New Work tab, you will see beautiful and unique wood plates but my heart falls for the flamboyant teapot identified as "Time Well-Spent." This teapot is now residing in the famous Kamm Teapot Foundation (www.kammteapotfoundation.org) which I previously talked about a few years ago. Clicking on the images will lead to additional info for each piece. Under the Sculptural tab, my preferred piece is the red and ebony vessel with unique feet named "The search for Clarity." The feet are making this very nice vessel just stunning. Under the Teapots tab, you can find my favorite one, but the 11 stacked-teapot set named "Infini-Tea!" is amazing. Under the Vessels tab, you will find beautiful vessels with pyrographed trees and distinctive finials. A unique source of inspiration. The turtle box (Surfacing No. 2) is a lovely box. This reminded me about the unique bowl that Paul M. is working on with turtle-like legs. Paul, are you going to add a lid to your amazing bowl?

Janine Wang (www.janinewang.com) is a turner and furniture designer and maker living near Corvallis, Oregon. She will be one of the two POP showcase artists featured next June at the AAW meeting in Raleigh, NC. You will find some of her work under the Furniture tab. I have been impressed by her design for feet rests on stools targeting maximum comfort. What a clever way to take advantage of multi-axis turning to make a stool finally comfortable for the user and one of a kind. Sculpturing the seat to facilitate moving the stool with a single hand is a very sweet idea. As you scroll down, make sure you remember next time you must frame a piece of art, how she did frame her depiction of the Twin Towers. The miter corner is just beautiful. With such a frame you will have to be careful not to steal the show to the framed artistic work. The turned handles to the various cupboard are splendid and would adorn with style any kitchen. As you go down on her site, make sure you see the "Grabbable Table" section. What a clever and beautiful way to decorate table and add an element of comfort every time you want to move such tables. If you have a suggestion on how to cut off a quarter portion of your turning, please let me know as I want to know how to do it safely. Enjoy the multiple discoveries.
